## <u>Program – Dr. Dennis Werner, Professor Emeritus -- Do You Know Miss Molly? New Varieties of Old</u> <u>Favorites: Redbuds and Butterfly Bushes</u>

Dr. Dennis Werner was born and raised in York County, Pennsylvania. Dennis was hired as an Assistant Professor of Horticultural Science at NC State in 1979 with responsibilities in teaching, and research responsibilities in peach breeding and genetics. In 1998, his research efforts shifted to ornamental plant breeding and genetics, focusing on *Cercis* (redbud) and *Buddleja* (butterfly bush). He is now an Emeritus Professor in the Department of Horticultural Science, still continuing his efforts in redbud and sweetgum breeding.

His recent redbud introductions are 'Ruby Falls', 'Merlot', 'Whitewater', and 'Pink Pom Poms'. His work in *Buddleja* has focused on sterility, compact growth habit, and expansion of the color palette. His butterfly bush releases include 'Blue Chip', 'Miss Ruby', 'Miss Molly', 'Purple Haze', 'Lilac Chip', 'Pink Micro Chip', 'Blue Chip Jr', 'Miss Violet', 'Miss Pearl', and 'Ice Chip'. In 2013, the American Horticultural Society awarded him the Luther Burbank Award for extraordinary achievement in plant breeding.

In addition to his research contributions, Dennis has been involved in undergraduate and graduate teaching and advising, and departmental administration throughout his career. In 2014, he was recognized for his teaching efforts and undergraduate student involvement by being named an Alumni Distinguished Undergraduate Professor.

Dennis is an avid gardener. His home landscape includes a 2,000 square foot herbaceous perennial border, and a diverse collection of woody shrubs and trees. Dennis has been married to Georgina Werner for 45 years. They have 2 children, Sarah and Beatrice. – *Annette Harrell, Chair, Programs Committee*
